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## BIOS

### **Diana Adams, Director, Vermillion Art Gallery & Bar**

Diana Adams is the proprietor of Vermillion, an art gallery and bar in Seattle's Capitol Hill neighborhood that opened 2008. Adams has been curating and presenting art shows in Seattle since 2000. She is the former owner of Aftermath, a venue that hosted fine art, punk rock shows and alternative site-specific performances. Her diverse and artistically dedicated background, have created a large network of supporters and collaborators. Adams earned her BA in Liberal Studies with an emphasis on photography and philosophy at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff. Adams has exhibited her personal fine art at Benham Gallery, Photo Center NW and Secluded Alley Works.

### **Elizabeth A. Brown, Independent Scholar and Educator**

Elizabeth A. Brown is an independent scholar, educator, and consultant specializing in contemporary art and the history of photography. From 200-2011 she was Chief Curator and Director of Exhibitions & Collections at the Henry Art Gallery in Seattle, following positions at the Allen Memorial Art Museum, Oberlin College, and the University Art Museum, UC Santa Barbara. She has curated over 50 exhibitions, including mid-career surveys of Kiki Smith [photographic work] and Lari Pittman [drawings], *WOW (The Work of the Work)*; and *150 Works of Art*, an innovative display of the Henry's permanent collection. Brown earned her B.A. from the University of Michigan and M.A., M. Phil., and Ph.D. degrees, all in the history of art, from Columbia University in New York. In completing her thesis on the photographs of Constantin Brancusi she held predoctoral and postdoctoral fellowships from CASVA at the National Gallery. In 2008 she participated in the Museum Leadership Institute, administered by the Getty Center.

### **Michelle Dunn Marsh, Executive Director, Photographic Center NW**

Over the last two decades, Michelle served in executive and creative roles in the fields of art photography and publishing. Her commitment to education, collaboration, and achievement of excellence have defined her career and gained her national recognition. Michelle's professional experience includes fifteen years with Aperture Foundation in New York City, first as a designer and later as deputy director for the organization, and as Co-Publisher of Aperture magazine. She was senior editor of art and design at Chronicle Books, San Francisco, and was a tenured professor in graphic design at Seattle Central Community College. He then went on to Chicago to work in commercial studios, shooting 8x10 color transparencies of beer, hamburgers and pharmaceuticals. So clearly, documentary photography has always been important to Mr. Giske! This love of realism and documentation has continued in his career in Seattle as Curator of Photography at the Museum of History & Industry, where a collection of more than 3.5 million photographs is shared with the public by way of exhibits, publications, and a searchable online database. Phen Huang is the director of Foster/White Gallery. Phen grew up in the gallery business in Canada. Her parents started the Bau-Xi Gallery in Vancouver in 1965 and in Toronto in 1975. The Huang family purchased Foster/White gallery in 2002 after being approached by Don Foster. Don wanted to ensure that the integrity of his business would remain intact. Under Phen's direction the gallery has continued as a thriving art establishment with a rich history and an inspiring future. Foster/White Gallery is one of the city of Seattle's most respected galleries and a destination for many tourists.

**Cory Verellen, Owner, Land Cameras & Rare Medium**

Native Seattleite Cory Verellen is a photographer and engineer who specializes in restoring antique instant cameras, with a passion for the analog beauty of Polaroid photography. Sometime in 2008, Cory dug out an old camera that was given to him by his father. From the first exposure from that Model 330 he was hooked. Putting his engineering know-how to use over the next few years he developed the line of cameras and upgrades available on LandCameras.com. As the demand for his cameras increased, Cory decided to open a brick and mortar store for Polaroid enthusiasts. In October 2011, he bid his engineering job at Microsoft adieu and opened Rare Medium Photography. The store houses Cory's full collection of Polaroid models and accessories for sale—from SX-70s to Colorpacks to 600 models and more. The mission is to help support the art of analog instant photography and create a collective space for Polaroid enthusiasts to convene. He welcomes all Polaroid photographers or people with a faint interest in this "rare medium" to stop by and chat, share their work, and participate in the store's roster of Pola-centric events. <http://landcameras.com/>
